Our Division 2 Kiwanis One Day was a great success. The Kiwanis Club of Pitman/Glassboro hosted a day of service for 38 people. Participants came from the Kiwanis Clubs of Woodbury, Winslow, Gloucester Twp/Blackwood, NJ Young Professionals, Old Bridge, and the Circle K Club of Rowan University. Throughout the day, we completed a variety of projects that covered different areas of interest Christina Lukac relates. Trauma Dolls and cards were created for the kids at Children's Specialized Hospital, a park was cleared of litter and debris, over \$10,000 worth of coupons were clipped for the Overseas Coupon Program, church windows were cleaned, and participants went to the local library to read stories to children. It was a wonderful experience to spend the day with so many people willing to donate their time to improve the lives of others. Thank you to all who participated!!!

The Woodstown Kiwanis club, Sandy tells us, hosted a combination Division Interclub and Division Election, for a shad dinner at the Ponderosa II, in Historic Alloway, NJ. Attending were members of every club in division 2, plus members from other clubs, as far away as Cape May. As usual, the Shad and Roe were excellent, the home made clam chowder was awesome, and no one went away hungry. Once again, our lovely and talented Lt. Governor, Joan Van Note was re-elected to another term!



Our speaker, Frank Stubbins, an accomplished glass blowing artisan, gave us an insight into the history of the glass industry in South Jersey. Frank also noted that the first glass factory in the country was located about 1000 yards from our location, at the Caspar Wistar glass works. Presently, a historic marker gives evidence of its former location on Rte 581.

Key Club and Builders activities were reported by Ed Barry & Ruth McGrath. Clearview made \$1,600 on their talent show. Money raised will be divided between the Children's Hospital, Haiti, Challenge Day, & Clearview High School Scholarship Fund. Paulsboro members are still tutoring grades 7-9. They will be donating food they collected to the Paulsboro Food Bank. They are also collecting coupons for service men and women overseas & soda cans for Ronald McDonald House. West Deptford is participating with 'Night at the Oscars', working on their annual volleyball tournament to raise funds for the Children's Specialized Hospital and volunteering at the nursing home in Deptford. Woodbury students read to classes at West End School and volunteered at the Central Baptist Church program. A March of Dimes Walk-A-Thon is planned.

The multi year projects involved raising a road to prevent flooding and a water purification project. Kiwanis is choosing their next World Wide Service Project. The winner will be announced at the International Convention in Las Vegas in June. There are three potential projects:

Malaria: Malaria No More and the Canadian Red Cross: Project proposes to end malaria deaths in Africa by 2015. Malaria kills 3,000 kids every day in Africa. The project would raise \$60 million over six years for mosquito net distribution, training and awareness.

Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus: UNICEF. The project would raise \$100 million to eliminate a deadly disease and save 129 million mothers and their future babies. NTD's are a group of 13 parasitic & bacterial infections. For approximately 50 cents per person per year, these diseases can be prevented and treated.

Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTD) Global Network for Neglected Tropical Disease Global Network proposes a 10-year, \$150 million investment. For approximately 50 cents per person per year, the diseases can be prevented and treated. Maternal and neonatal tetanus kills one baby every 4 minutes. Tetanus is highly preventable. Three doses of a vaccine can protect mothers and babies.



Our guest reader at the Child Development Center on February 24th was Mother Goose. Ann Fenimore, a retired teacher, was dressed up to entertain the little children from ages 6 months to 2 yrs old. Mother Goose, and the children's' reactions are always fun. Our Kiwanis Club presents each child with a book to take home. Money from our fund raising events is used to buy the books says Kathleen O'Connor.

This is a summary of Paul Palazzolo's Address given to NJ District Kiwanians on April 15, 2010 at the Wyndham Hotel in Mt Laurel.

Paul began by telling us the 3 things which are important in his life: marriage, family and Kiwanis. He continued talking about what Kiwanis means to him. "Those were the days" does not cut it today. Our clubs must change and reevaluate our priorities into meaningful service and fun with our members. Everyday in every way we must get better and better and better.

Building a stronger Kiwanis Family relationship with K Kids, Builders Clubs, Key Clubs, Circle K, Aktion Clubs and other Kiwanis Clubs will make us the greatest service organization in the world. When we work with these clubs in our Kiwanis family we need to strengthen the activities that we do with them. Our Kiwanis family can help us as much as we can help them to serve the children of the world.

Getting new members by drawing from professional people of different race, color and sex will add new life to your club. Whether they are retired or currently in the work force we need to enhance our clubs by asking people from different walks of life to join our club in our communities. A new member's induction is important in our clubs. This helps to close the back door of members leaving our club. We need to ask what Kiwanians want to get out of their club. We can do this by having a community survey and a member survey taken by each member. You may get an example of these from Kiwanis International: 1-800-KIWANIS ext 411. Everyone club needs to do the FOUR I's: Invite, Inform, Induct and Involve.

Kiwanians need to remember that our main purpose is in serving the children of the world. Young Children Priority One started October 8, 1990.
